## Learning About Weather—Teachers' Notes

Having a fun time with wind is a great way to teach young children about the weather. Why not look out for the next gusty day to take your *Wombat* class on a 'wind walk'?


First, select a gusty day and look out for signs of wind. You'll need the following materials:



- Blown-up balloons
- Crepe paper streamers or scarves
- A large rubbish bag

Next, take your class to a window or have them sit in a sheltered area outside. Ask your class to tell you in which direction the wind is blowing. Ask them how they can tell.

Once outside, lead your class in these activities:



- Run faster than the wind—then slower.
- Skip with the wind. Jump. Hop.
- Stand still and move your arms with the wind.
- Twirl and whirl like the wind!
- Wet a finger and hold it up to the wind—what do you feel?
- Provide streamers to run with and balloons and bubbles to chase which way do they go?
- Collect the balloons and streamers and put them in the rubbish bag before returning to the classroom.
